In the Beginning...

With only \$9,000 and a few months to find a suitable facility and make ready, Chaminade high School for Boys was founded in the fall of 1952 by the Society of Mary (Marianists). They were seeking to expand their secondary educational mission in Southern California in addition to providing living and working quarters for their "postulants"—i.e., high school candidates to the Marianists.

A former academy on Cattaraugus Street in the Cheviot Hills area of West Los Angeles was selected for the new school. It is said that the buildings were severely rundown, and the grounds resembled a jungle. But in July of 1952, Brothers James Wipfield and John Perko, who later became the first principal, enlisted the help of many fellow Marianists. Within only two months the buildings were spotless, the grounds were renovated, a chapel and library were established, and an outer building was converted into a chemistry lab. The Original Pioneer Marianists at CHAMINADE HIGH SCHOOL FOR BOYS were Bro. John Perko, first principal, Fr. Don Bracht, Bro. Henry Honnert, Bro. James Loughran, Bro. John McEnhill, Bro. John Samaha, and Bro. Eugene Zapp. They welcomed 114 day and resident students INCLUDING a senior class whose total enrollment was 3 students!

With the need for updated and expanded facilities, another search was launched, and the San Fernando Valley was a logical choice given the direction of development that was taking place in Southern California. The new high school was built in Canoga Park.

1954-1955: 1st published yearbook

GROWTH:

The portrait of Fr. Chaminade, Founder of the Marianists, at the main entrance symbolizes the aims at Chaminade High School; namely, "education comprises all the means which enable the school to sow, cultivate, strengthen, and render fruitful the Christian spirit in souls." The "chapel is dedicated to Our Lady, Mediatrix of All Graces—where devotional practices deepen the religion convictions of students." The "main approach to Chaminade High School. The Cross dominates the building, even as it pervades every education activity at Chaminade."

1955-1956

<u>1956-1957</u> No regular yearbook published...

Bro. John Perko, principal, Cheviot Hills, created an abbreviated 40-page yearbook entitled "interludes of 1957." The contents include formal photos of faculty, staff, each graduate, group photos of sports teams (football, basketball, baseball, track), and extracurricular activities (band, pep club, class officers, Sodality, speech club, actors, yearbook staff, and mothers' & dads' clubs).

BRO. JOHN PERKO, principal, Cheviot Hills.

- Yearbook dedicated in '58 to Bro. John Perko as "the dedicated teacher, the man of faith, the affable leader."

1958: Bro. James Loughran: Celebrated Silver Jubilee in '58 as a working brother in the SM. Described as "responsible for the smooth running of the school...with his kindly advice, his helping hand, and personal interest in every student.

Fr. Francis May: When he "died at the age of 74 all who knew him felt they had lost a personal friend."

Fr. Ted Ley, 1958 grad: Involved in many activities including leadership roles.

POSTULANTS:

High school age candidates for the SM who lived on campus. Other boarders on campus were present for thirty years. It was a unique program for a Marianist high school in the USA.

SODALITY:

Blessed William Joseph Chaminade was very dedicated to forming the laity in Sodalities or faith communities called to do corporal works of mercy especially with the youth of Bordeaux, France. In the 1900's in the United States as Marianist religious started directing secondary schools and universities, Sodalities were established in its educational institutions such as Chaminade H.S.

1958-1959

-Yearbook states, "in Brother Steele the students found an understanding quietly humorous man, an educational leader completely dedicated to Chaminade High School."

Bro. John Zimmermann: Served as Treasurer and public relations director. The 1959 yearbook dedication to Bro. John cited him as "kindly, considerate, interested, and generous."

1959-1960

SODALITY:

Sodalists work on canned food drive, Christmas card sale, and days of recollection. Their largest project and a "first" was the annual Sodality Convention of the Province of the Pacific hosting delegates from the bay area, Los Angeles, and Hawaiian Islands. "Mastermind" behind convention for "excellent planning" was Marianist Fr. Leo Uht.

The Sodality worked on the "Catholic Action" model, which was to OBSERVE, JUDGE and ACT.

Agenda:

- Central theme presented— "The Sodalist and His Vocation;"
- Extracted practical applications from the topic.

FOOTBALL HEAD COACH:

John Vukelich, former football star at the University of Dayton, started coaching in his specialty of football at Chaminade in addition to coaching basketball, baseball, and track from 1956-1961. He also taught social studies and physical education. The sports section of the 1960 yearbook is dedicated to Coach Vukelich. On Oct. 22, 2004, the JOHN VUKELICH athletic field was dedicated to John and the dedication plaque cites him as "COACH, ATHLETIC DIRECTOR, TEACHER." John, who now lives in Northern California, comes annually for Homecoming, and gives a "pre-game" pep talk to the football team (as of fall, 2022).

BRO. VINCENT STEELE, principal, Canoga Park.

Chaminade High School relocates to Canoga Park. **BRO. VINCENT STEELE** receives blessings for success when the school is re-located. The **SODALITY** takes on the direction of "supplying Christian leaders to the school" which is accomplished in the different divisions. It was felt that "by the influence of Christian principles we can have a stronger and better student body."

FR. WILLIAM O'CONNELL, school chaplain and Sodality Director, (who now lives with the Marianists in Cupertino as of spring, 2012), offered the Baccalaureate Mass in the Chaminade Chapel for the last graduating class from the Cheviot Hills site.

The AERIE yearbook, which never had a name change, is the home of the Eagle. All the Eagle's activities are centered around his nest. Since Chaminade has the nickname of "THE EAGLES," the yearbook was named the AERIE. "This was done because the yearbook is centered around the life and activities of the Chaminade students. The Aerie recaptures all the activities and memories of the school year. It serves to remind the students of what they have done and why they should be proud of their school."

1961-1962

SOLEMN BLESSING OF CHAMINADE:

On April 1st, parents and friends of Chaminade joined with the faculty and students in "solemnly asking Almighty God to bless our school." These yearbook passages underscore the faith-filled attitude of the staff: "The months of actual construction would not have ultimately met the success that they did without a many provident blessing from heaven...And the reason for this continued assistance of Providence was simple: God will not be outdone in generosity. For the success of the entire year was only possible because of the generosity of many individuals: the faculty, the students who continued with the school despite the great distance...and when people are willing to do this for a higher, spiritual motive, the guidance and protection of God is assured....If we at Chaminade can continue this same spirit of giving, we can be confident that the Dedication's Solemn Blessing will prove efficacious for years to come."

Bro. Vincent Steel welcomed His Eminence James Francis Cardinal McIntyre, Archbishop of Los Angeles for the Solemn Blessing of School. The Dedication Program also indicates that Chaminade had the services of the Louisville Choir and Chanters who sang Gregorian classics such as *Veni Creator Spiritus*.

This year with the new campus and new buildings was viewed as Chaminade "making a fresh start."

RESIDENT DIVISION:

Approximately twenty-five boarding students are featured in the 1962 yearbook. Some boarders are pictured cleaning and buffing the dorm floor while others are cramming for finals. "In the resident Division at Chaminade, the education of young men is both complete and continuous. From morning till night, in school or out, the boarder constantly learns self-discipline, either self-discipline of the mind or of the body. Founded on a solid spiritual, intellectual, and physical basis, life as a boarder at Chaminade is vigorous and rewarding."

SODALITY: "The Sodality of Our Lady experienced this year a spirited revitalization, due largely to an active and effective Sodality Council. The Council did much to unify the efforts of the individual cells." Council meetings were established on a regular basis, and general meetings of the whole Sodality were called frequently. All Sodality activities were coordinated under a three-fold scheme, corresponding to the offices of zeal, instruction, and temporalities in the Society of Mary. Moreover, contacts with the larger Sodality organizations were maintained as Fr. William O'Connell accompanied students to the National Marianist Sodality Convention in Milwaukee and to the California Convention held at Serra High School. Within the school, the Sodality improved linkage with the Student Council through the Sodality Representative. Overall, the Sodality was hopeful that it had gone a little further to advance its own spiritual welfare and that of the whole school.

ORA ET LABORA - PRAYER AND WORK:

Blessed Chaminade founded the Society of Mary on the Rule of St. Benedict which had the motto *ORA ET LABORA*. The annual staff gave special mention to Marianist Brothers Anthony Young and James Loughran. "The work of these two men has been tremendous. Bro. Anthony who is responsible for all the landscaping...seeks occasionally the assistance of some of the resident students. Bro James is continuing at our new school in his work as supervisor of the cafeteria..." and "is in charge of the general maintenance of the entire school plant." The yearbook staff summarized: "We would like to take this occasion to show them our appreciation and to thank them sincerely."

The **COUNSELING DEPARTMENT** developed a comprehensive service for Chaminade students under the leadership of Bro. **Edward Maushart** assisted by **Fr. William O'Connell**. This year the work of the department was "greatly augmented by the allotting of several rooms and other facilities in the Administration Building solely for counseling. A collection of pamphlets, brochures and other guidance related materials is developing on an ongoing basis. The Chaminade students of coming years can look forward to even better things from the school's counseling department.

CALIFORNIA SCHOLARSHIP FEDRATION: Each year Chaminade participates in the California Scholarship Federation (CSF). To qualify, students must meet four out of the six semesters of their last three years. Requirements include a 3.25 scholastic average and participation in at least two extracurricular activities. It is hoped that this program will continue as one of Chaminade's best traditions.

AERIE DEDICATED TO BRO. VINCENT STEELE:

Bro. Steele praised for working untiringly to keep Chaminade going. "Moving to the new location in Canoga Park was one of his outstanding tasks." Oftentimes "he had to rely solely upon our motto, 'Fortes in Fide, Strength in Faith,' to get through a tough situation. His determination and strength have made both Chaminade and the student body what it is today."

Bro. Vincent also celebrated his Silver Anniversary--twenty-five years as a Marianist Brother--for which AERIE further congratulated him in its 1963 dedication.

CHAMINADE MARIANISTS AFFIRMED:

In an introductory passage for the faculty section, an AERIE staff member states, "The Chaminade Marianists in particular have instilled into our entire faculty, administration, and student body the idea that a leader of any kind, but especially a teacher, must have *perseverance* and the ability to foster it in others; *enthusiasm* and a knack for making it infectious; *knowledge* and the ability to transmit it; he must know *discipline* and when to administer it; he must have *understanding* and strive to increase it between himself and his students; he must have *faith* in *his God*, *his students*, and *himself*....We of Chaminade should feel thankful; we have been blessed with more than our share of this type of men."

EXPECTATIONS FOR INVOLVEMENT:

Besides emphasizing student expectations for effort and achievement in the daily scholastic routine, the Marianist staff encouraged students to do more for Chaminade, to make it a "more enjoyable place for everyone," and to see students develop their own abilities more extensively through active participation in extra-curricular activities. It was felt according to the AERIE editors that these activities are "where we learn to be leaders, to learn to win and lose, to coordinate our abilities, and prepare for our Catholic adult life. They are designed to make each of us a whole man."

FR. WILLIAM O'CONNELL:

The 1964 yearbook was dedicated to Fr. William O'Connell to "in a small way express our deep appreciation for his efforts." Fr. O'Connell was cited for working long and hard for Chaminade in several positions—school chaplain, Jr./Sr. class counselor, Sodality, and Mother's Club moderator. One final comment from AERIE, "The most striking aspect of the good priest is his eternal willingness to help the student. Walk into his office, and immediately he puts down his work that he might talk to you and help you."

RESIDENTS: The Chaminade resident division is "a home away from home." The life of the resident is rather unique. There is the regular school day program of classes, activities, sports, and social life and then there is the living together in a family for almost thirty young men. Eating, playing, studying, praying together...Chaminade men from SOUTH OF THE BORDER, Hawaii, out of state; near and far, different interests, backgrounds, abilities living together. It is an experience that most of the resident students feel is a good one.

BRO. GERALD O'NEIL:

Although Bro. Gerald O'Neil only served as Chaminade's principal briefly (less than 1.5 years) until "he was suddenly taken from Chaminade to another school in need of his ability," he was awarded a "Co-Dedication" by the yearbook staff. "With his leadership the students became deeply involved with the school and came to understand the faculty better. Bro. O'Neil also gave the students many responsibilities to help develop themselves.

CAFETORIUM GROUNDBREAKING: This building when completed would become the first addition to the original facilities on the high school campus. It was eventually named the Bob Hope Center after the famous actor comedian. Chaminade's president and director of development, Bro. Hugh Hoganson, was credited with conducting lengthy negotiations to make the cafetorium an accomplished fact.

SODALITY UPDATE:

The senior Sodality "cell" developed a plan of action by sending members to the various parishes to offer their services. The Sodalists successfully initiated a program to meet the needs put forth by the pastors "despite any and all obstacles."

Notes from: SESQUICENTENNIAL ISSUE of ChamiNotes

1) Marianist sesquicentennial celebrated Nov. 5, 1967, at Bob Hope Center for students, parents and friends with Mass followed by reception.

2) On Sept. 17, the Canoga Park Chapter of the Marianist League established. Fr. Robert Mackey, SM, addressed the charter members at their initial meeting. The purpose of the League: "is to be the other hand of Christ—the lay hand and six words spell out this purpose: liturgy, apostolate, social action, recruitment, ecumenism, and service."

BRO. FRANK SPAETH:

"This year the unanimous choice of Bro. Frank T. Spaeth, S.M. as 'our man of the year'—the person we want most to honor—took only a few seconds...We see in Brother a man of solid genuine character, an understanding kind gentleman who burns himself out day and night for resident and day student alike. To the former he is like father and mother; for the latter there is the image of Bro. Frank, the man in black covered with chalk moving rapidly about the class wringing every ounce of knowledge from his students. We see him giving hours of his time helping a guy with math, with his track time or with his personal problems. Come to school on a weekend or free day and you will find him repairing or construction something; not for himself—for Chaminade. We think he is great, because he never seeks recognition, he is cheerful, deeply religious—above all he is our friend. For these and a thousand other reasons, we The Class of 1968 dedicate this book to you, Brother Frank, hoping that it may in some way show our deep appreciation for your generous service to us."

SPIRITUAL LIFE: "In the day swirl of Chaminade life an underlying religious spirit continually manifests itself. A meaningful relationship with God is the objective of the spiritual activities that dot the school calendar." There are frequent opportunities to receive the sacraments—class Mass every two weeks and a monthly student body Mass. Both students and teachers search together for a deeper and more personal liturgy.

SPEECH and DEBATE:

BRO. WILLIAM McCALL, the club moderator, reflected "that significantly the year had shown that the future looks promising for the Chaminade Speech Club if the underclassmen continued their efforts in speech. The club turned in a good record with many first places and a few gold medals. The bright spot was the persistent winning ways of the novices."

CHEMISTRY/PHYSICS CLASSES BENEFIT FROM COMPUTERS:

The school was "very grateful for the acquisition of three computers, manufactured by Monroe and valued at \$10,000." The Science department has greatly benefited using these computers in classes. The school was able to inaugurate a completely new course—computer programming.

HIGH SIERRA CLUB:

This eighth year of the Chaminade High Serra program "found Bro. McCall and his intrepid hikers in the Kings' Canyon National Forest area...The rough physical demands leave every hiker with a feeling of true accomplishment." The Sierra trip "not only builds the Chaminade man physically, but also builds him in leadership and responsibility."

FRONTLINE:

The members of FRONTLINE, along with students from Louisville and Canoga Park, tutor students from K to 6. Most of the students taught are of Mexican American descent and all are to spend extra time on their studies. At the Guadalupe Center these students are given individual attention which many times they do not receive in school.

"The AERIE staff dedicates this yearbook to the 20ieth Anniversary of the existence of Chaminade Preparatory. We hope that the school will continue its existence for at least another twenty years."

Bro. Farrell receives dedication from the 1979 AERIE staff. Bro. Farrell's response in letter addressed *Dear Students*: "I hope that in ten or twenty years wherever you may be, you will take the time that is necessary to feed the hungry; give drink to the thirsty; comfort the stranger; clothe the naked and visit those who are sick or in prison...By healing and caring for each other it is possible to make the world a better place for future generations...Now the challenge has been given to you to become good persons, persons who are more interested in giving than in receiving, brave enough to stand up for what you believe, and like Christ always willing to help and forgive."

LIFE: (Living in Faith Experience): "For ten days during the summer of 1978, twenty members of the Chaminade family went to a retreat in the Santa Cruz Mountains known as the Life Workshop. The Life Workshop has grown throughout the past year and has played a prominent role in the spiritual life of our school."

FROM CHAMINOTES: "\$100,000 OFFER OPENS GYMNASIUM CAMPAIGN...providing the school raises \$200,000 within the next two years...Mr. and Mrs. Uribe accepted honorary chairmanship of the Gymnasium Campaign Committee...Final cost approximately \$500,000."

YEARBOOK DEDICATION to BRO. WILLIAM McCALL:

"Academic excellence is the expression that best characterize the goal of the Chaminade faulty. One of the teachers most responsible for this reputation is Bro. William McCall. He has been with us since 1957 and is considered one of the founding brothers. The students of the Canoga Park campus recognize him for his commitment to learning and his ability to communicate with others. Besides teaching English, he is moderator of the High Sierra Club, which has been active in summer treks in the wilderness. The student body wishes to express appreciation for his outstanding work and acknowledge his contribution to our school."

LIFE update: "The LIFE group meets each Sunday night during the school year. During the summer of 1979, ten members of the group participated in the week-long LIFE retreat held in the Santa Cruz Mountains near San Jose. Other participating students were from Los Angeles, San Jose, San Francisco, and Hawaii."

CAMPUS MINISTRY:

"The purpose of campus ministry is to promote Christian growth and development among the total school community." This year service areas were in *liturgical events*, programs to develop and improve Christian attitudes, and involvement in Christian service. The religious affairs singing group attempts to promote student body involvement at Mass.

- 1) Actor ROBERT CONRAD named Honorary Director of Chaminade's AAU-sanctioned October Reservoir Run.
- 2) "DALLAS" STAR LINDA GRAY TO APPEAR AT HOMECOMING: "Miss Gray is a former Chaminade Homecoming Queen, and now plays J.R.'s wife, Sue Ellen, on the highly touted CBS series."
- 3) CHAMINADE VICE PRESIDENT, FR. JOHN McENHILL CELEBRATES 25th anniversary of ordination.

Fr. McEnhill's association with Chaminade began with the opening of the school in 1952 when, as a young Brother, he was part of the initial faculty. He returned as chief administrator of Chaminade in 1964. During his tenure, Father inaugurated numerous improvements at Chaminade. He introduced a creative salary scale for its teachers and brought in the first retirement and disability insurance program for them. The Bob Hope Center, the resident student dormitory and biology laboratories were all constructed under his administration. He also arranged the first lease of what is now the Chatsworth Campus, thereby introducing seventh and eighth grade programs to Chaminade for a full six-year system. In 1969 Father John was named principal of Riordan H.S. in San Francisco, where he remained until his return to Chaminade in 1976...Since his return to Chaminade as vice-president, Father John has directed the recently successful campaign to fund the Uribe Sports Center. Aside from his administrative duties, he also serves in campus ministry and in counseling at Chatsworth.

4) ALUMNI REPEAT Career Night: "Last year's successful Alumni/Student Career Night will be repeated this September. The career counseling program is especially vital to juniors and seniors...but it is open to all students and their parents."

The retreatants return with a new sense of brotherhood and self-worth. The Christian love discovered is, hopefully, a lasting one."

CHRISTIAN ACTION MOVEMENT (CAM):

CAM is "a group of students here at Chaminade dedicated to the idea of living through loving." The group visits the Spastic's Children Foundation and the West Park Convalescent Home. When CAM travels down to a boys' orphanage in Tecate, Mexico, the participants play soccer in the dirt fields with the boys.

FROM CHAMINOTES: LOOKING TOWARD OUR 30th YEAR:

"As Chaminade nears a third decade of community service, its faithful advocates look to the past with pride and to the future with confidence—confidence born of success. Academic standards attained in the past by Chaminade have earned extensive recognition...Growth factors in terms of increased facilities, courses, staff, and enrollment have been astonishing throughout its thirty years...The Master Development Plan, which has successfully produced the Chaminade Science Wing and the Uribe Sport Center in the last six years, continues in effect for the future. Remaining on the plan are the Theater Arts Building and the Canoga Park Campus Chapel...But most important Chaminade's primary objective remains the basis of motivation—to develop in each student a responsibility to the Ultimate as well as the immediate. As a Catholic school, God must be the anchor-point from which inquiring young minds pursue the truth, and the Source from which our children will become the mature, productive citizens of tomorrow's world."

CHAMINADE - THEN:

"In October of 1952, former Archbishop James McIntyre officially dedicated a new high school in California, setting the stage for thirty years of outstanding academic achievement and spiritual guidance...Only months before, the archbishop had requested Bro. John Perko, S.M., to establish a school in the West Los Angeles area. The indomitable Brother began the task with little more than faith, determination, and the incredibly meager sum of \$9,000...Brother Perko's search for a site ended with a former academy on Cattaraugus Street in Cheviot Hills. The buildings were severely rundown, and the grounds resembled a jungle. Nonetheless our beloved founder saw the potential...In July of 1952 he set to work, gathering the aid of fellow Marianists Fr. Don Bracht, Bro. Henry Honnert, Bro. James Loughran, Bro. John McEnhill, and Bro. Eugene Zapp. Together they labored like pioneers in an undeveloped wilderness, painting, building, begging, and bartering for supplies and equipment...Within only two months, the buildings were spotless, the lawns were renovated, a chapel and library were built, and an outer building was converted to a chemistry lab. By September 1952, the brothers of the Society of Mary were ready for their first entrants, and they named the new school Chaminade in memory of their order's founder, Father Chaminade."

THE BEGINNING:

"To some, the beginning would have seemed inauspicious. Chaminade High School for Boys opened with only four classrooms, six teachers and 113 students, including the senior class with a total enrollment of three boys! For the brothers, however, 1952 was a triumph. From those humble origins, the school evolved so rapidly that the Cheviot Hills facilities became inadequate. In 1960 land was purchased in Canoga Park, and in 1961, with construction completed, Principal Bro. Vincent Steele moved Chaminade to its present location...As the school's superior academic record became known, applications for enrollment increased drastically. By early in 1969, the necessity of further expansion was obvious, and Chaminade administration negotiated a lease for the present Chatsworth campus. In the fall of 1969, Chaminade opened both campuses, advancing from a four-year to a six-year educational program...During 1971, in order to again meet community needs, the decision was made to provide a coeducational program, and the first young ladies arrived in February, 1972...As this unexpected period of growth developed, the Marianists transferred ownership of the school to a local corporation governed by a 12-member Board of Directors, which includes Marianists, lay teachers and administrators, and business and professional persons from the community. At that time, the name of the institution was changed to Chaminade College Preparatory."

CHAMINADE TODAY (Sept. 1981):

"Today Chaminade has 1,250 students, thirty-one classrooms, five science labs, two libraries, two cafeterias and assembly halls, two baseball fields, football fields and tracks, and nine outdoor basketball courts. Construction of our long-awaited Sport Center was completed in May of 1981, providing one of the finest facilities in the city...At present there are seventy-five members of staff, nine academic departments and ninety-four course offerings, plus a complete athletic program and twenty-seven student activity clubs...In retrospect, such growth is phenomenal. And it is to the credit of the entire Chaminade Family that the school has attained this measure of success. Let us thank God for the blessings of these past years and pray for His continued grace and guidance."

CHAMINADE'S PREVIOUS RESIDENT DORMITORY has been transformed into a modern and valuable asset for the Canoga Park campus, providing six more school classrooms and sorely needed office space...Much as Chaminade regretted having to close the residency program, demands for this service diminished each year. Finally, a decision was made to convert the seventeen-year-old structure, and renovation was begun last summer...The major overhaul has resulted in large, light and airy classrooms equal to the best contemporary standards. The three facilities downstairs will provide art, mechanical drawing, and drama/mass communications classrooms. Those upstairs will be utilized for speech, math, and English classes...The Fine Arts Department, in particular, has been enhanced by the renovation. Mrs. Juliet Rohde, Department Head, has worked under severely confined conditions in the past.

Additional library materials and other school improvements are realized through the assistance of the Parents' Association. Les Dames faithfully host special recognition events, and the alumni make our annual career night a memorable occasion."

A MESSAGE OF WELCOME FROM THE NEW PRESIDENT:

"St. Thomas More, late friend of Henry VII of England, often spoke of the joyous heart of the convinced, practicing Christian. It is my hope that all of us in the Chaminade family can enter the new school year with such a gift of heart, which can only be tested and strengthened by the various problems and stress all of us are subject to, as participants in the human condition."

"Staying with the theme of participation, I hope each student will avail himself of the academic opportunities offered to him/her. Also, joining with pure academics in fostering an enjoyable educational experience at Chaminade, are our extensive extra-curricular offerings: sports, drama, competitive forensics, fencing, etc. Giving ultimate purpose to these activities and helping define their purpose and value, will be our campus-sponsored spiritual activities and opportunities for guidance and spiritual growth. In this we certainly welcome our non-Catholic sisters and brothers in Christ, for much in this aspect of Chaminade's Marianist education transcends individual doctrinal differences. We do know the Spirit breathes where He will, and we are all one in God's love...Again, Welcome! Join with us. Participate! All is for the best regarding the students and the sustaining and improvement of Marianist education here at Chaminade."—In Christ, Bro. Wm. McCall, S.M., President Chaminade Preparatory

FR. McENHILL NAMED PRINCIPAL:

In the absence Bro. Robert Maguire who is on academic assignment in St. Louis, Fr. John McEnhill, S.M., is a familiar face to the Chaminade Family. He was a faculty member on the original Cheviot Hills campus and served as principal at Canoga Park from 1964 to 1969. He returned to Chaminade in 1976 as Vice-Principal and Coordinator of Development...Father holds master's degrees in School Administration, Counseling and Educational Psychology, and was completing his doctoral program when asked to fill in the vacancy at Chaminade.

ALUMNI HONORS RAUSER:

This year the Chaminade Alumni presented their fourth annual "Distinguished Service Award" to Joe Rauser, a member of the Chaminade family for 18 years. His varied contributions to Chaminade include teaching English, religion, history and coaching basketball, football, and cross country. His enthusiasm in the classroom and for his teams in competition is renown. Mr. Rauser served as dorm director for two years and has also held the position of Dean of Boys and Assistant Principal. He is an extremely popular and familiar figure on the Chatsworth Campus. He has given unselfishly of himself for the benefit of the Chaminade Family. Joe Rauser, We Thank You!"

"To see students coming back from retreats spreading the joy and love that they have experienced continues to remind us how much God must be part of our life and the lives of our families. REVIEW of SCENERY CHANGES at HIGH SCHOOL CAMPUS:

Expansion since 1952 with the move from the Cheviot Hills area campus to the West Hills location includes the building of the Bob Hope Student Center in 1965, the leasing of the Chatsworth campus in 1969 (later purchased in 1987), deciding to go co-ed in 1972 and completion of the Uribe Sports Center in 1981. Through the efforts of the Chaminade Boosters, the football field is now the scene of night football games and meets. The new stadium and lights, built and installed in 1986, provide a welcome and dramatic change to the campus. On Nov. 2, 1988, it was announced that new buildings will replace the modulars which are currently in use due to the ninth grade move to West Hills in the fall of '88. Students, parents, faculty, and administration eagerly await the projected new buildings on the West Hills campus.

40 YEARS REMEMBERED:

"On the 40th anniversary of Chaminade College Preparatory, we acknowledge how exceptional our school has graphically portrayed the leadership, drive, and spirit of our student body. Spiritually, Chaminade life was an underlying religious spirit which continually manifested itself. This spirit became most evident when the student body entered in common worship and attended Mass every two weeks with their class, and monthly with the entire student body. Throughout the years of Chaminade, both teachers and students searched together for a deeper and more personal liturgy.

Life at Chaminade was an experience which was complete and thorough in both academics and everyday life. To the resident students, Chaminade was both a home and school. It contained a full academic spectrum and challenged the students with activities, a loving atmosphere of fellowship, and a spirit which was both engaging and alive.

Although the Chaminade curriculum is college orientated, not simply academic achievement is stressed. No, a deeper understanding and respect for persons and a vivid social awareness are deliberate by products of the school. Parents, students, and faculty combine in a joint effort to build an organization that makes the words, 'Christian living' take on a true perspective.

Chaminade prides itself on providing a well-rounded lifestyle for each individual student. It offers a wonderful education, an inspiring religious perspective, and it especially influences the students in how to socially survive in modern times."

Here's what a couple of graduates said about their graduation from Chaminade:

- 1) "People who normally would have gotten lost in a larger community seem to have a sense of being found at Chaminade. The school went out of their way to diversify itself. Although we were a Catholic school, a lot of room was made for non-Catholics. They made room for alternative thought." ('76).
- 2) "I think the liberal aspect of the school is good because it allows the students to express themselves...I thought Chaminade was strong. We were good at everything...I see Chaminade springing forward and far and getting involved with the new technological teaching aids that will have an impact on the students and change Chaminade completely." "A cloud of dust arose as the bulldozers began the construction on the improved Chaminade Fine Arts facility...Students will be occupying the Fine Arts building beginning in the 1993-94 school year. The facility will include nineteen new classrooms each."

NATURAL DISASTERS RAVAGE: The Santa Ana winds, on the first day of their autumn arrival, brought some of the worst fires Southern California has ever see. Although the fire never threatened Chaminade, ash and smoke did envelop the school on more than one occasion. The fires destroyed more than five hundred homes and severely threatened many homes of Chaminade students living in Topanga and Box Canyons.

6.8 EARTHQUAKE STRIKES THE SAN FERNANDO VALLEY: On Jan. 17, at 4:31 a.m., a devastating earthquake awoke the entire valley. Centered in Reseda, but known as the "Northridge Quake," it was the biggest quake to hit Southern California in the 20ieth Century. Chaminade made out with very minor damage, although Chaminade Hall at the middle school campus was heavily damaged. The earthquake displayed once again the ability of people from different walks of life to assist each other in times of need.

CORRESPONDENCE to the Chaminade Board of Directors from REV. QUENTIN HAKENEWERTH, Superior General of the Society of Mary, following his visit to the campuses in February of 1994. His office is located in Rome, Italy: "First of all, the student body reflects a multicultural society which is a growing reality throughout the world. This is perhaps the most important and most urgent lesson needed in the world today. We saw this lesson being taught and learned at Chaminade.... Secondly, Chaminade is definitely a Catholic school, although many of the students are not Catholics. When we asked the students about this, one of them said, 'At Chaminade the Catholic viewpoint is clearly presented, but it is not shoved down our throats. There is a great respect for every religion represented on campus.' We found the students to be proud of the diversity and of the harmony created out of it. This ecumenical reality at Chaminade is an encouraging example that respect, and unity are possible in a diversity of religious beliefs...The third impression is of the participative style of education taking place at Chaminade. We noticed this among the administrative staff itself, as well as between the students and the administration and staff. The students feel that they have a real responsibility for their school and a real participation in its governance. As one student said, 'We cannot govern ourselves, but we do share in running the school. Our ideas are accepted, and they are often put into practice.' At Chaminade we found both the mentality and the structures necessary for real participative governance is the way of the future." (From: A Report to Friends, 1992-1994)

WASC ACCREDITATION – WHAT DOES WASC MEAN FOR CHAMINADE? WASC is the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. In order for a school to receive an accreditation from WASC, it must prove that it has the best interests of its students in mind and is willing to improve to better serve the students. Every six years, Chaminade comes up for reaccreditation. Before the evaluating committee arrives at Chaminade, the school forms twenty-four committees to review all aspects of the school. The committees are comprised of students, teachers, parents, secretaries, and school board members. These committees discern what is working well and point out areas that the school could improve. The entire process of surveys, committees and reports takes about eighteen months.

NAMES IN THE NEWS: *Bro. Leroy Viera Creates a Lasting Impression*: "He lovingly refers to them as the 'Blessed Mama,' but Brother Leroy's familiarity is completely understandable after creating more than 90 of the 18-inch, ceramic statuettes of the 'Blessed Mother' to stand in reverent display in each of Chaminade's classroom in Chatsworth and West Hills...The 'Blessed Mother' project has taken more than two years to complete in his spare time, and was done at the request of Father Allen DeLong, when Father first saw one of Brother's creations. 'I've made so many, I wore out the mold,' Bro. Leroy explained. A mold is only good for between 75 and 100 castings, and that is only the first step in a lengthy process that includes sanding, refining the delicate features, multiple coats of color and glazes and two firings in temperatures more than 1,900 degrees. Bro. Leroy's art has been an uplifting contribution to the school, and we all say thank you for your time and loving care!"

JOE RAUSER and DAVE REEVES TWO FACULTY MEMBERS REACH 30-YEAR MILESTONE: "It is with great pride and admiration that the Chaminade Community congratulates two outstanding and respected members as they celebrate 30-years as faculty and administrators; Joe Rauser and Dave Reeves."

Joe Rauser "recently celebrated his 30th anniversary teaching at Chaminade where he is well known among the middle students of English and history. From teaching to assistant vice principal at the high school, he has worn many hats, including girl's track and field, and cross-country coach. He and his wife, Shirley, spent one year living in and running the campus dormitory a little more than 18 years ago. But of all his many contributions to the school, Mr. Rauser's greatest is his love of teaching and the relationship he develops with his students."

"Dave Reeves is a 1960 graduate of the high school when it was located in West Los Angeles." He first joined the teaching staff in 1965. GIVING OUR STUDENTS WITH THE GREATEST NEED IS A KEY TO SUCCEED: "One of the biggest dilemmas in administrating a school such as Chaminade is how to keep tuition affordable while helping it grow and flourish at the same time. Each year the administration and the board of directors grapple with this challenge, because their ultimate goal is to provide our families with the very best in Catholic, college preparatory education, while maintaining tuition at a fair cost...Tuition, no matter the cost, often causes angst for a variety of reasons, and for those families whose need is most crucial, financial aid has been a vital part of the tuition program at Chaminade since 1963...The board of directors as well as the Marianists wish to see the financial aid endowment funds grow, because the principal will indefinitely provide a steady supply of earnings for this important project regardless of current economic trends...Because the funds are limited, currently the sole criterion for school-sponsored financial aid is need. Like procedures followed by colleges and universities, need is determined by a thorough analysis of a financial application and tax returns...Over the years, that system has helped hundreds of deserving students and their families."

IN MEMORIUM – BRO. MELVIN SILVA, S.M. – "With the deepest sense of sorrow, Chaminade said good-bye to beloved religion teacher, Bro. Melvin Silva, S.M., who died Nov.11, in Honolulu, of cancer. Brother Mel was 66 and in the 44th year of his service as a Marianist."

FATHER LARRY MANN, S.M., CELEBRATES GOLDEN JUBILEE: "Father Larry Mann, S.M., has devoted his life to young people. We must maintain what we have, plus plan for the future and implement expansions. Ninety-five percent of all implementation is done in house—from cabling to applications'..." MARIANISTS: In 1952 the Marianists started Chaminade for boys in Cheviot Hills. The original buildings were extremely run down to the point of being condemned. The Marianists, who were also the faculty, quickly decided to move to a new campus and found property in Canoga Park. The property was a huge ranch surrounded by a breeding area for thoroughbred horses. By 1961, the Marianists began teaching at the new Chaminade Preparatory. The Marianists were soon unable to support the school. Therefore, they formed a Board of Directors out of the faculty, which was made up of Marianists and lay people. The Board of Directors decided to deed over the property to the corporation of Chaminade with the understanding that the Marianists would remain part of the faculty and staff.

45 YEARS TO OUR CREDIT: "Chaminade High School for Boys was founded in the Fall of 1952 by the Marianists who were seeking to expand their educational mission in Southern California and providing living and working quarters for their postulants... A former military academy in the Cheviot Hills area of West Los Angeles was selected for the new school. The buildings were severely rundown, and the grounds resembled a jungle." Brothers James Wipfield, John Perko, and many fellow Marianists helped pitched in to make the buildings spotless, to renovate the grounds, and to establish a chapel and library all within two months... By the 1960s "with the need for updated and expanded facilities, another search was launched, and the San Fernando Valley was a logical choice given the direction of development that was taking place in Southern California. The Marianists again took tools to hand and literally built the new high school from the ground up. Our continued building and development is part and parcel of the Chaminade story. At the core however, the Marianists and our mission guide us'... to form morally aware and academically capable people to be outstanding contributors to the future'."

Small Christian Communities (SCC's) are all Part of LIFE: "One of the newest lines to be heard in the social world of Chaminade H.S. is, 'Hey are you going to SCC?' Small Christian Communities, or SCC's, have continued to be a growing success. The L.I.F.E. team in cooperation with Campus Ministry has facilitated these Tuesday night meetings in an effort to create a Christian environment for Chaminade students and faculty. A regular group of about 30 students, under and upper classmen alike, attend an experience that is a blend of prayer and family. Each session is led by volunteers and varies from meditation to small group discussion with prayer that reflects a particular theme. The sessions themselves often echo a retreat-like setting. The meetings, held in Campus Ministry every other Tuesday at 7:30 p.m., offer a warm, welcoming atmosphere to all. Beyond its religious side, SCC's help build community and friendship among the Chaminade students; bringing freshmen and seniors together." One senior said this about SCC's: "It's a break away from my busy schedule and a place where I can refocus on what's really important."

CARDINAL ROGER MAHONY BESTOWS AWARD ON BRO. Leroy: "With more than seventy local religious Brothers in attendance, Chaminade's Bro. Leroy Vera was honored at the annual Brotherhood Recognition Dinner by Cardinal Roger Mahoney for his years of service in the church. Following Mass at the Archdiocesan Catholic Center, the dinner event was highlighted with the accomplishments of Bro. Leroy during his almost 50 years in religious service, of which the last eight have been at the High School where he is invaluable to the Physical Plant Department."

MIDDLE SCHOOL'S RCIA PROGAM CONTINUES TO GROW: The Right of Christian Initiation adapted for children (RCIA) began this school year with sixteen students. 50th YEAR CELEBRATION: Over fifty years ago, "The Marianist Province of the Pacific envisioned expanding its educational mission by opening a high school in the Los Angeles area. This school would continue the Marianist tradition of Catholic education first founded by Blessed William Joseph Chaminade in 1817. The Marianists' vision was realized in September of 1952, when Chaminade High School opened in the former Cheviot Hills Military Academy in West Los Angeles. With an initial all-male student body of 114 students consisting of two freshman classes, one sophomore class and a combined junior and senior class, and with many of the students boarding at the school, the early Chaminade was different in name and appearance than the one we know today...Many vital aspects of the school remain the same from its beginnings fifty years ago. We see this clearly in the *Characteristics of Marianist Education* that continue to inform the school's mission. From those earliest years we still have our beloved Chaminade Eagle, a mascot inspired by an eagle, that adorned a tower on the Cheviot Hills campus."

"Seven years after the Cheviot Hills campus opened, when it was learned that the school needed significant and expensive remodeling to improve the safety of the buildings, Chaminade's administration and Board of Directors began the search for a new location. This search brought them to nineteen acres of land on the other side of the Santa Monica Mountains, in Canoga Park (now called *West Hills*), where groundbreaking for the new high school took place on January 22, 1961. When the school opened in September of that same year, its name had been changed to Chaminade Preparatory. Still an all-boys school, some students continued to board while others commuted daily from West Los Angeles. Chaminade began admitting girls to the student body during the 19971-72 school year."

"Over the following decades Chaminade continued to grow, officially changing its name in 1987 to Chaminade College Preparatory, and expanding its facilities and developing programs to offer an unparalleled educational experience. Chaminade students benefit from an active Campus Ministry and retreat program that encourages spiritual growth, a rigorous academic curriculum, an athletic program that develops physical abilities, and extracurricular opportunities that helps to explore a variety of talents and interests. Awarded the prestigious designation as a *National Blue Ribbon School of Excellence* in 1997, Chaminade was recognized on a national level for something we have known for years: *ours is a very special school.*"

"Now in its 50th year and long past the days when some students lived on campus, Chaminade continues to be a place that many call home. From its birth in Cheviot Hills to now, Chaminade has positively touched the lives of thousands of people, enriching their minds and their faith. Through the dedication of its exceptional faculty and staff, the support of its parent community and the achievements of its student body, Chaminade continues to be a place where the Characteristics of Marianist Education withstand the currents of social change, helping young people develop their God given talents to create a more just and peaceful world."

CELEBRATON of the School's 50th ANNIVERSARY: From *Chaminade Now*: "Plans began more than three years ago as Chaminade administrators, board members, faculty, student, and alumni representatives first gathered to brainstorm the most significant way to recognize and celebrate...A logo was created to visually remind us of the significance of the 2002-2003 school year. It adorned stationery and banners that waved from streetlamps on each campus and along the avenues of both West Hills and Chatsworth. The school history was carefully researched, chronicled, and detailed in a beautiful keepsake document...Our special relationship to the Society of Mary was recognized at Founders Day when Very Reverend David Fleming, S.M., Superior General, traveled from Rome to commemorate the School's founding by the Marianists."

HIGH SCHOOL BREAKS GROUND ON CONDON FAMILY CENTER FOR SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY: "The Chaminade College Preparatory community gathered on Sunday, May 4, at the High School campus in West Hills to break ground on the second new building to be constructed at Chaminade as a result of a successful capitol campaign raising more than \$6 million in the past three years. The building will be named to honor Thomas J. Condon, alumnus of the Class of 1956, and his family, whose foundation has significantly supported this project. It will be called, "The Condon Family Foundation Center for Science and Technology."

INNER-CITY PARISH SCHOOL VISIT SPELLS JUST PLAIN F-U-N: "With planning that rivaled a military campaign, St. Turibus Parish School of Los Angeles made their second trip to Chaminade's Middle School for a day of fun. The campus literally hummed with excitement, music, and laughter as Chaminade's 650 middle schoolers played host to their 260 elementaryaged guests...What began five years ago as a community service project, has blossomed into a very special relationship between the students of both schools—definitely a 'win-win situation'."

AN INDIAN SUMMER: "Reach Out has become one of the most prominent projects within this last year. Four students and Frontline advisor, Barbara Tweedy, have managed to rally support behind the cause...This summer students from the High School flew to the ghetto regions of northern India to supply products such as basic hygiene necessities, clothing, and meals through monetary donations. All the money went directly to the poor, while airfare, housing, and food accommodations were at the expense of each student who took part.

The open book represents both education and scripture, while the eagle, Chaminade's mascot, stands for our school community that strives to be noble, strong, and brave. The 1952 date is Chaminade's founding year. Encircling and completing the seal, is our outward identity, Chaminade College Preparatory.

RALLY TO LIGHT THE NIGHT: "On Sunday, October 8th, students, teachers, staff, and parents from both campuses turned out at Warner Center Park in Woodland Hills for the eighth annual *Light the Night*, a two-mile fundraising walk organized by the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. These generous walkers formed *Team Kelsey* in honor of 8th grade Kelsey Burke who was diagnosed with Leukemia in June of this year.

What's OLD is NEW AGAIN – Fencing, Wrestling and Equestrian Gain Student Popularity: These sports are gaining momentum on both our campuses. Chaminade Now reported on the progress of the 22-member equestrian team, but it is important to note that the Middle School wrestling team fielded more than 50 members this year and Fencing is enjoying its greatest success since 2001."

ROBOTICS PERFORM WELL IN ATLANTA: "The Chaminade Robotics Team, led by advisor, Nancy McIntyre, traveled to Georgia for the second straight year to compete in the FIRST National Robotics Competition."

LIFE LESSONS: "Since its inception thirty-six years ago, the Marianist LIFE Program for high school students has changed lives by empowering teens with strong leadership skills and by giving them experiences that strengthen their faith and responsibility to serve others. Through their diligent and dedicated service, these twenty-five students serve as a nucleus to plan, coordinate, and carry out our High School's liturgies, MLCs (Marianist LIFE Community special events to foster and encourage fun, spiritual-based activities), and all religious retreats. But what's also important about this group is their ability to draw classmates from all parts of the student body to also take part in the program of Campus Ministry...At the recent calendar planning meeting, LIFE Team Member, Annie White, '07, described LIFE as a 'religious student council.' ROBOTICS ROCKS HAWAII: Nine Chaminade students, a teacher and an engineer headed to Hawaii in June to assist Governor Linda Lingle in bringing the FIRST Robotics Program to all the high schools in her state. The award-winning Eagle Engineering robotics team trained local teachers and students for the 2008 FIRST Regional Robotics Competition during a series of free workshops offered in conjunction with Chaminade University of Honolulu. The student workshops included hands-on Vex building sessions and final competition.

TAKING THE MORAL HIGH GROUND: "The Future Business Leaders of America decided to run a business under the recommendation of club moderator, Aron Gideon. They watched *Black Gold*, a documentary about the lives of coffee farmers in Ethiopia. Although *coffee* is one of the world's most traded products, *coffee* farmers in developing nations see little profit. They are often forced to abandon their fields for more profitable crops such as the narcotic 'chat' just to feed their families. The purchase of Fair-Trade coffee helps provide farmers with a fair living wage. The name *HIGH GROUNDS* was chosen because the coffee beans are harvested and sold under Fair Trade practices. Everything sold at Higher Grounds Café is 100 percent organic and shade grown. Students are buying eco-friendly coffee that provides education, clean water, and healthy food to developing nations, including those farmers documented in *Black Gold*.

HARMONY IN HAWAII: "The Chaminade Middle School C-Notes, Hula Club, and the Chaminade High School Harmony Chorus traveled to Hawaii on a singing tour during Spring Break last April. They performed at the Oratory Rose Chapel on the campus of Chaminade University of Honolulu. 'Collaborating with our extended Chaminade community at Chaminade University on the island of Oahu was a wonderful way to exemplify our Marianist theme of *educating in family spirit*,' says Kathy Rohrs, C-Notes choral director. Introduction: "About three years ago, Mike Fritschner '09 was told he would never walk again, after suffering a tragic accident. He swore then and there that he would defy his diagnosis and walk again. And as he walked up to receive his diploma on June 6th, he achieved that goal." EXCERPTS: "After sending nine days at Queens Hospital, I was medevacked back to California to Northridge Hospital. I would spend three months there. Here, doctors would tell me I had no chance of ever walking again... You, the senior class, have stood by me through something that has devastated and destroyed so many other people's lives, but not mine. My injury allowed me to become friends with all different types of people and I am so thankful for these friendships... I travel to John Hopkins in Baltimore, Maryland three times a year for two weeks of physical therapy to recover from my spinal cord injury. When I was first injured, I could not feel anything below my sternum. Today, I can feel all the way down to my mid-thigh. I can stand and walk in leg braces. One day, I will walk again. On that day, I will remember all of you who have stood by me through thick and thin. Thank you, class of 2009, for standing by me."

In addition to moderating Student Council, Ms. LaBelle plans all of the dances and rallies, coordinates the Cage and Eagle's Nest, and organizes the school's annual Diversity Week. For those of us who have worked closely with Ms. LaBelle, it is obvious that she cares deeply about Chaminade students and actively strives to create memorable extracurricular experiences for all of us. Even for those who haven't worked directly with Ms. LaBelle, if you have yelled your head off at a rally or spun

around on the dance floor with your friends or participated in a diversity workshop exercise, you have been directly touched by her love for Chaminade."

DIVERSITY WEEK: Over fifty students were involved with the school's Diversity Team. An outside expert in diversity awareness, Calvin Terrell, conducted weeklong diversity workshops for students, faculty, and parents. The hope of the leaders of diversity awareness is "to improve the climate of respect and sensitivity to different populations within and outside of the school through a program of diversity education and awareness that permeates all aspects of the school."

From Chaminade Now: "Chaminade students may participate in Diversity Team-led Mix It Up lunches, Unity Week, Freshman Unity Days, International Culture Week and Festival, and Justice Week, and they may also serve as hosts of the Special Olympics. Every event stress that only through inclusion, tolerance, and understanding can Chaminade be a welcoming environment for students of all backgrounds.

MIX IT UP DAYS: Hosted by the Diversity Team, this special lunch encourages students to sit with peers they normally would not socialize with on a regular basis.

UNITY WEEK (Nov. 14-18, 2011): The Unity Week assembly speaker helped sophomores and juniors see the importance of "Breaking Down the Walls," and empowered all students to create a positive and supportive environment to bring unity to Chaminade. All sophomores and juniors participated in workshops which gave them opportunities to talk to each other in honest and candid ways about their experiences with diversity issues, and ultimately taught them about themselves, their peers, their teachers, and the importance of bullying prevention.

FRESHMAN UNITY DAYS: In February 2012, Keith Hawkins will speak to freshman boys and girls as separate groups. The boys will learn the skills they need to grow from boy to manhood, while the girls will learn to take ownership of their lives and to use tools that will give them control over their own destiny. Each group will participate in team building and leadership workshops, explore ways they can share their experience with other young people.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS: Competitors, students and staff came together as Chaminade once again hosted the Special Olympics of Southern California. As the competitors walked through the welcome tunnel and under the balloon arch, the young athletes were greeted by Chaminade student volunteers with high-fives and accolades. This year saw the track and field competition run in high gear as the competitors gave it their all. Chaminade students worked closely with LAUSD staff, volunteering at each station and helping wherever and whenever they were needed. Chaminade's KNAD – a student run radio station – entertained the entire day and broadcast the history of the Special Olympics.

CHAMINADE MIDDLE SCHOOL HOUSE SYSTEM: The House System is one of the unique experiences that helps create family spirit among students of all grade levels. Essentially, every 6th, 7th, and 8th grade X block is placed into one of eight groups, or "houses," each with a sampling from every grade. The houses have a faculty leader, a name, and a color. Students also have leadership roles, and this encourages involvement from a range of students that goes beyond the usual student council leaders. To get to know one another and to create unity, house meetings are held. During assemblies students sit according to house rather than grade. Throughout the school year, during Spirit Week or through various service projects and school activities, competitions are held, and points are awarded. At the end of the year, the house with the most points win the House Cup, a perpetual trophy. Eagles earn points for citizenship, first and second honors at first semester, student participation in clubs and athletics, accelerated reading, the Religion Game Show, door decorating during Catholic Schools Week, Gala drawing ticked sales, and Founders Day events.

The House System debuted during the 2010-2011 school year, after a two-year planning process. Middle School faculty members Jennifer Bader, Annette (Dietel) Damien '01, and Kate Lospalluto '00 introduced the idea after hearing about its successful implementation at other Marianist high schools.

CHAMINADE CELEBRATING 65 Years: Along with the 200th anniversary of the Marianists' founding, the 2017-2018 school year also marks the 65th anniversary of Chaminade College Preparatory...The Chaminade High School for Boys opened in 1952 at the former site of the Cheviot Hills Military Academy. At the time, the Marianists were seeking to expand their educational mission in Southern California. By the end of the 1950s, though, the need for updated, expanded facilities inspired the search for a new property in the San Fernando Valley...The search led the Marianists to Canoga Park and, in the fall of 1961, Chaminade welcomed students to the newly constructed facilities. As the 1960s wore on, Chaminade continued to grow and, in 1969, Chaminade established a Middle School in Chatsworth for boys, grades 7, 8, and 9. Finally, in 1972, both campuses became co-educational. From then to now, Chaminade has continued to adapt and change. Since 1952, Chaminade College Preparatory has educated thousands of young men and women. Both campuses have expanded dramatically including the addition of the Tutor Family Center for Performing Arts (High School), the James V. Adams Center for Innovative Learning, the Joseph A. Rauser Library Commons, the addition of a sand volley ball court (Middle School), and the renovations of both Campus Ministry offices.

CHAMINADE ACQUIRES SHOPPING CENTER ADJACENT TO WEST HILLS CAMPUS: In March, CCP's president Robert Webb announced that Chaminade had acquired the shopping center adjacent to its high school campus in West Hills. "The Saticoy property is a rare find for our school community," said Webb. "Over the past several years, our board of directors and administration have focused on our financial health in the event that an opportunity like this would present itself." The 4.8-acre shopping center currently houses sixteen businesses, including Field's Market. "We look forward to hearing from the community—faculty, staff, parents, students, alumni, neighbors, and others—about how this property can factor into our educational future and neighborhood."

Middle School and High School Students Launch Recycling Program for REDS: Fr. Josephraj Rymond, SM, District of India, served as our chaplain from 2017–2019. He and Bro. Tom Oles, SM, enlisted help from students in our high school Environment Club and the middle school EPICC (ecology program) to collect money from recycling plastic bottles and aluminum cans at the school campuses. Proceeds were sent to help fund the Marianist REDS ministries in India. Started 30 years ago, REDS (Ragpickers Education & Development Scheme) was originally focused on providing support for the children who picked through trash looking for recyclables to sell to survive. Today, the program continues to operate ministries aimed at helping impoverished children and their families create a better life through education and training. Chaminade bought 50 large, bottle-shaped recycling bins that were distributed to both campuses for recycling. The program raised about \$2,000 for REDS this first year.

Marianist Fr. Ted Ley '58 Celebrates 60-Year Jubilee of Religious Life: Fr. Ted's journey with the Marianists began as a student on the original Chaminade campus in Cheviot Hills. He was the fifth student body president. He directed the music in Chaminade plays and was actively involved in speech and debate. Upon graduation from Chaminade, Fr. Ted entered the Society of Mary and after religious and professional studies, served Marianist schools in California, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and Switzerland. Fr. Ted came from a musical family. In 1963, he won the choir conducting prize of the American Guild of Organists. In 1976, Fr. Ted founded the Schola Cantorum of the Pacific, which provides free music education to children in need. He returned to Chaminade in 2000 and currently serves as chaplain and in 2018, he was named a Founder. Congratulations, Fr. Ted!

DENNIS HAAS, Longtime Friend of Chaminade Leaves Behind a Lasting Legacy: Dennis Haas humbly and faithfully served CCP for 48 years. A former Marianist, he later worked and retired from IBM but managed to volunteer at CCP where he led Kairos retreats, moderated LIFE, and helped the Advancement Office. He was honored by Chaminade in 1989 as one of Chaminade's first founders. After Dennis died Feb. 17, 2017, his brother, Loren Haas, informed CCP that Dennis made a philanthropic contribution through a planned gift. Dennis Haas has left an indelible mark on the school family through his years of service, his uniquely simple and humble ways, and now his incredible philanthropy.

THE CHAMINADE WELLNESS PROGRAM: Last year, Chaminade parents, alumni, faculty, staff, and friends were asked to invest in the newly created Wellness Program. During the Fund-A-Need portion of the 2018 Gala, the Chaminade community raised more than \$111,000 to jump-start the program and give Chaminade the tool needed to expand the school's vision to develop resilient students who are adaptable self-advocates and can successfully balance school life. The Wellness program addresses topics such as alcohol and substance abuse prevention, sexual abuse and rape prevention, and anxiety and depression, as well as offer faculty additional in-service and professional development opportunities...Chaminade is integrating the wellness program into the curriculum through health and religion class, guest speakers, and the creation of on-campus activities.

Advanced Placement CAPSTONE Program Adopted by Chaminade: Chaminade applied and was accepted to the AP Capstone Program for the school year of 2017-2018. The College Board since 2014 sponsored and developed this program to high schools around the world. The program presents a two-year curriculum and students' choice to join either their sophomore/junior year or junior/senior year. The rigor and relevance of the program is upheld with a mandated five-day summer teacher-training workshop, which has been attended by Chaminade teachers and administrators for the past two years. Instructional goals of AP Capstone "focus on the mastery of skills' sets over memorization of content." Our faculty participants felt that the program is an excellent fit for Chaminade with its emphasis on individualized learning, writing, and an interdisciplinary approach to studying. The program opens access to students beyond the more traditional, subject-area AP classes. Students well-suited to participate in the AP Capstone Program need to possess a strong work ethic, a solid responsibility for their choices, and a willingness to grow in their critical thinking skills. Finally, it was stated that "the stakes are high regarding collaboration, and students must develop their communication abilities and aptitude to synthesize material while considering various points of view."

QUARANTINE: During pandemic time, there was an increase in the usage of technology. Programs such as Zoom helped to connect with family and friends. Finishing the school year online affected everyone on campus. Seniors had to deal with the cancellation of some of their last memorable moments in high school. The school was able to show support and love for the Class of 2020 through various ways such as faculty and staff delivering CONGRATULATIONS signs to the houses of seniors and lighting the football field for 20 minutes in honor of the graduating class. A VIRTUAL COFFEE HOUSE took place on May 8th as students were still quarantined at home. Many sang, played instruments, and collaborated with others. As the Concert Choir's trip to Italy was cancelled due to COVID-19, they were still able to perform from that program during the Virtual Coffee House.

ONLINE LEARNING: Varied faculty members commented on this new style of teaching: "I had the opportunity to design a new approach to online theatre classes. The Zoom app enabled me to see my students and they were able to see each other, connect, perform, and create...The online learning experience has illustrated to me that students, teachers, parents, and staff can rise to any challenge and continue education, no matter what the circumstances...The hardest thing about online learning was not being able to see my students in person. I missed interacting with them.

RISING UP TO THE CHALLENGE OF THE PANDEMIC: Remarks from Robert Webb, President: "This past spring, with the pandemic growing in our country and across the globe, I witnessed the strength of our Chaminade family as we adapted to a new educational environment. I am proud of how our faculty and staff, much like Father Chaminade, demonstrated fortitude during difficult times, by quickly providing distance learning to ensure the health and safety of our students and families. We rose to the challenge before us by continuing to foster and nurture our family spirit through our first VIRTUAL GALA, livestreamed prayer services and Masses, online rallies and social events, as well as a drive-through culmination event and online graduation for our high school seniors and middle school eight graders...We certainly miss the joy that comes with being on campus-seeing students in the classrooms, gathering in the hallways, competing on the Deep Blue C, creating and entertaining in the Tutor Performing Arts Center, and celebrating in the DeLong Center and Uribe Center."

CHAMINADE WELCOMES FR. MICHAEL CHIURI, S.M.: Chaminade is delighted to welcome Marianist Fr. Mike Chiuri, as our new priest-chaplain! The Marianist Province of the United States has recognized the continued need for a priest-chaplain and has assigned Fr. Michael Chiuri, S.M., to serve at Chaminade. Current chaplain Fr. Ted Ley, S.M. '58, will remain in residence at the West Hills Community and will help Fr. Mike acclimate to life at Chaminade. We thank Fr. Ted for his years of service to Chaminade and are delighted that he will continue to impart his wisdom and knowledge to his alma mater.

<u>STUDENTS/TEACHERS MAKE THE BEST OF A TOUGH SITUATION UNDER THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC'S THREAT</u>: Chaminade did more than just survive...it prospered. The school year proved to be a springboard to greater innovation in the delivery to students and families as well as an opportunity to reflect and become more intentional about our mission.

HERE ARE SUPPORTING REFLECTIONS PROVIDED BY FACULTY AND STAFF:

In March 2020, faculty and staff met to determine how they could adapt and change to the new social distancing rules. During the fall semester, many activities and events continued to happen—but in a virtual rather than a physical space. Using Zoom and live streaming, the school rallied to embrace the changes. Our caring, hardworking educators worked to give what they needed in this difficult year. Students and teachers made the best of a tough situation by staying enthusiastic about their studies.

THE ARTS DIDN'T MISS A BEAT: While musical and dramatic practices and meetings were held using Zoom, performances reached their audiences via live streaming. Working from home, film students continued to make films. Every class was entirely virtual. The school year culminated in a virtual film festival. Several films went on to win awards at film festivals outside of school.

MASSES AND CHARITABLE WORK CONTINUED: Students and families were able to access prayer services virtually. Services were videotaped by students and staff. Small groups met weekly on Zoom for prayer. These sessions were livestreamed through the school website. Our middle school students were still able to enjoy beloved events such as Grandparents' Day and the blessing of the animals, all held virtually. Our high school students were able to experience retreats and complete service projects over via Zoom. Operation Gratitude on Ash Wednesday engaged 140 high school students in preparing bracelets, scarves, and other items for our military. Another 125 high school students organized over Zoom to make thank-you cards and letters for the school's essential workers. Ministry Mondays were started by Campus Ministry. The sessions became an opportunity for a small group of students to make connections during the lockdown and not to feel so isolated. The retreat program also underwent adaptations.

Normally, Campus Ministry conducts 15 overnight retreats throughout the year. Instead "retreat bites" or snippets were held, each with a different name and theme. The first was called, "In Trust" and the second was "Agape." The senior retreats in February and March were adapted to feature partly online hybrid formats. In the fall, Chaminade students from all grade levels helped build community by packing and distributing food to more than 1,200 families in Canoga Park.

<u>VIRTUAL RALLIES HELPED SUSTAIN STUDENT ACTIVITIES</u>: Even with homebased Zoom activities, the middle school Mock Trial team won second place in the Junior Division at the 43rd Annual Los Angeles County Mock Trial Competition. Speech and Debate, Model UN and Robotics clubs engaged in Zoom regional competitions.

STUDENT COUNSEING NEEDS MET THROUGH INNOVATION: From summer College Boot Camp to college application workshops, from virtual visits by universities and colleges for students to monthly College Connection Zoom meetings for parents, families of students in grades 9-12 received background and preparation for college applications. The counseling office, working with the Diversity Team and Campus Ministry, presented programs on social issues, mental health and incorporating faith in one's life. Counselors met with students daily. The school therapist continued meeting with students and running student wellness groups. The parent education series continued through evening Zooms. Topics covered ranged from helping students stay motivated during remote learning to mindfulness training for parents. The former in-person College and Coffee sessions for parents of all grade levels were renamed College Connections and were held in the evenings on Zoom, with presentations by counselors and visiting college representatives. The annual summer Application Boot Camps were held online. College admission representatives were also hosted online and were open to all grade levels.

<u>NEW STUDENTS MADE WELCOME</u>: In March 2021, new sixth graders were welcomed to the middle school. Organized into "stable groups," they stayed together for activities, including orientation. Ninth graders came to campus for the first time for orientation on March 19. Divided into two groups, each group reported on different days to limit the number of students on campus at the same time. This was the first time ninth grade students were able to meet each other and their teachers in person.

THE RETURN OF ATHLETICS: When the pandemic hit, the athletics department had to reschedule more than 3,000 games. Each time the lockdown rules changed new protocols had to be written. For each rescheduled game, staff needed to make sure facilities, officials and other teams were available. January 2021 marked the restart of cross-country competitions for the high school team and the beginning of a compressed five-month season for fall, winter, and spring sports. In June 2021, twenty sports were going on simultaneously. Intense, but it worked! As Athletic Director Todd Borowski said, "It was fun. Six days a week, six nights a week since January. It's very fulfilling in that we were able to compete and for the players to have some success. On one day, for example, we had home games in football, baseball and basketball (normally three different seasons)." Despite the year's challenges, the school basketball team won the CIF-SS Division One title. Basketball "season" continued over the summer, and August 27, 2021, marked the first home football game and the return to a regular sports schedule.

NEW GRADS HONORED AND CELEBRATED: "Drive through events were arranged for seniors to obtain their senior gear and to mark 100 days until graduation in February. The traditional Senior Sunrise event was held in person in March, a tradition that included a doughnut truck, photo taking, and a lawn sigh for each senior that proudly read "Chaminade Class of 2021." At another drive-through, the Tour de Nade, seniors picked up their caps and gowns and turned in their laptops...In February the eight grade students also marked their 100 days until graduation with a similar drive-through event.

CLOSING REFLECTIONS ON 2020-2021 SCHOOL YEAR: Middle School Campus Ministry Director, Kate Beskid '00, said, "There were some great things that came out of this tragic year.... When the pandemic hit, we had to become more creative about how to include the students and move away from more traditional experiences. We were able to focus on the students and help them grow in their faith. We became much more intentional in our programming. As I reflect on the past year, all the hardships and all the work the students did to make the most of their experience, to see the students able to attend their graduation in person was probably the best night of my whole school year and made me beyond proud of the programming and experience we were able to offer the students." All in all, while it may not have been quite the year anyone had envisioned, Chaminade school spirit—among students, faculty, and staff—remained high." Go Eagles!

CHAMINADE LAUNCHES CAPITAL CAMPAIGN IN CELEBRATION OF 70th ANNIVERSARY

FULFILLING OUR MISSION: Reflections from Robert S. Webb P'18, '20, President

"As we celebrate Chaminade's 70th anniversary this year, it is a time for reflection as well as celebration. I look back at our history with gratitude for the Marianists who established our strong foundation as a Catholic, Marianist school, and for those advocates and supporters who left their legacy at Chaminade to ensure we can continue to fulfill our mission for generations of future Eagles. We celebrate a renewed commitment to making our school environment a place for our students to thrive, as they have endured a truly challenging few years. I am honored to share with you some exciting plans for Chaminade's next 70 years. Just prior to the pandemic, we developed a forward-thinking Two-Campus Master Plan that will transform our school and take it to an entirely new level in terms of academic excellence, safety/security, and wellness. The proposed infrastructure changes will provide our students with a safer, more supportive environment, as well as help ensure Chaminade remains at the forefront of Catholic education for years to come. Phase 1 of the Master Plan focuses on transforming the campuses by modernizing 1960s structures through strategic replacement and renovation, providing new and enhanced campus facilities, and improving the safety and security on both campuses by creating more restrictive access to student areas. To make Phase I of the Two-Campus Master Plan a reality, we have embarked on a \$7.5 million 'Soaring to New Heights' capital campaign to raise philanthropic funds toward thee \$39 million project."

A Campus for the FUTURE:

Like those early visionaries, the Chaminade board of directors and administration sought to similarly prepare for the coming decades. Committed to staying at the forefront of Catholic education and ensuring the continuing future of Chaminade, they embarked on a comprehensive strategic planning process, building on Chaminade's strengths and evaluating areas for growth. The result was the development and completion of the 2017-2024 Loving, Learning, and Leading Together Strategic Plan and a new Two-Campus Master Plan adopted by the board in 2018. The purchase of the 4.8-acre Saticoy property across the street from the high school became the impetus for many of the athletic upgrades proposed in the new plan. Input was gathered from our school family, and existing facilities and future needs were evaluated. Many of the campus buildings required remodeling and updating. Other changes center on improving campus safety and security, as well as the addition of new buildings and sports fields. The school is working to obtain rezoning approvals and permits for the high school to move ahead with the plan for groundbreaking in Summer 2025. Fortunately, funders like the Fritz B. Burns Foundation agreed with the plan and made the largest gift in the history of Chaminade--\$3 million, to fund a new Welcome and Student Services Center. Chaminade alumni and families have made generous philanthropic commitments to the campaign that have brought the campaign closer to its \$7.5 million goal.

Middle School Campus New Plan: Improvements enhance vital programs and student safety.

- *New Middle School Science Lab for academic excellence.
- *New Middle School STEAM Lab for collaborative and experiential learning.
- *Relocated Middle School Entry and Administration to divert traffic off-campus and increase safety by having the administration in a building with a secure lobby closer to the main entry gate.
- *New Entry Court and Courtyard and a series of interior gates and fences to improve campus safety and ensure the security of the campus perimeter.

<u>High School Campus New Plan</u>: Improvements enhance and centralize student services, expand access to athletics for increased student wellness, and improve safety

- *New High School Administration Building/Welcome and Student Services Center: The new "front door" to the high school with entry to the main campus at the bridge. It will include Administration, Counseling Center, New Library, Two new classrooms.
- *New and Renovated Athletic Fields: New baseball and soccer field on the 4.8-acre Saticoy property and renovation of the current baseball field into a softball and soccer field.
- *Bridge to High School Campus: Provides safe access to the new entrance and academic core of campus from new student parking spaces on the Saticoy property.
- *Two New Quads: Safe, traffic-free student gathering places for rallies, outdoor classes, club fairs, and meetings.
- *Relocated Campus Ministry: Places Campus Ministry at the heart of the campus in the former administration building
- *Two Art Studios: New classrooms in the former library are designed to support arts education.

IN LOVING MEMORY: in the 2021-2022 yearbook, the Chaminade community grieved over the death of two stalwart staff members. Zach Boren, "Laptop Hospital" Technical Specialist, from 2010-2021 serviced students, faculty, and staff very diligently with care and friendly humor. He steadfastly dealt for months with incurable cancer...Candice Looper, Attendance Officer since 2009, passed away in her sleep very unexpectantly. "Candice was beloved by her colleagues and knew each of the students when they entered her office. Her 'I love yous' were exchanged daily and she never failed to make every student feel that Chaminade was home away from home. She will be forever remembered by Chaminade students as an exemplar of Marianist values, especially family spirit.

<u>CHAMINADE RETREATS</u>: The Chaminade tradition of retreats is alive and well-even through the last two years of COVID. For staff and students, it is an integral part of a Chaminade education, a means of growing in understanding—of oneself, one's peers and one's faith. Campus ministry educators enthusiastically report that students of all ages and faiths benefit from this time of reflection...Each retreat has its own theme, unique curriculum, and goals and activities.

<u>EAGLE FEST</u>: Music...Food...Sports: Saturday, April 9, 2022, was an evening to remember as Chaminade's gala benefit and auction was reimagined into an exciting new signature fundraising event, **Eagle Fest!** The inaugural outdoor spring festival was held on the West Hills campus and welcomed more than 500 parents, alumni, and friends who enjoyed a variety of delicious food, wine, brew, and spirit booths from 23 local exhibitors.
