Our Marianist Saints, who are inheritors of the Apostolic tradition, participated in this preservation of the Paschal Mystery. Through their determination and faith to follow God's will and rely on God's providence, they invited men and women to remain steadfast in their belief in Jesus Christ's mission of bringing the Reign of God into the world. Through their words and actions, they demonstrated the importance of bearing witness to God's love, mercy, and compassion, especially by looking to Mary, the Mother of Jesus, as a role model and being grounded in relationship with one another through community.

It is fitting to look at some writings from our founders, Blessed Chaminade and Blessed Marie of the Conception, to see the importance of the Easter event.

Blessed Chaminade:

"And [he] was raised for our justification" [Rom 4:25]. It is the faith of the Resurrection. It is the imitation of the Resurrection that makes us just and faithful. To believe in the resurrected Jesus is the reward of faith. To imitate the resurrected Jesus is the reward of works. We must believe in the Resurrection if we want to be Christians. We must imitate the Resurrection if we want to live as Christians.

Blessed Marie of the Conception:

3. We are in a season when everything should help us raise our hearts to God and provide us with topics for reflection. First: the plants, the trees, everything is reborn, and should we alone remain unchanged! Let us be reborn in Jesus Christ. Easter is here! 2. May we be born to a new life during this holy season, my dear friend. If we share the life of our divine Redeemer, others will discern in us his spirit – His maxims and His actions.

4. The resurrected Jesus dies no more. He must be the model of our own resurrection. His body is agile, subtle, and impassible. Similarly, our souls must be insensitive to the attractions of the world, prompt in following the will of God, and disengaged from the senses and creatures.

5. Let us belong to God forever, without reserve or relapse; we owe this for so many reasons. We are privileged children of the grace of a God who has always had for us a preferential love.
